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Raisi v Pekingu: Strategické plány Íránu a Číny jdou na plný plyn

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Návštěva íránského prezidenta Ebrahima Raisiho v Pekingu a jeho osobní setkání s protějškem Si Ťin-pchingem je přelomovou záležitostí hned v několika ohledech.

Raisi, první íránský prezident, který oficiálně navštívil Čínu po 20 letech, vedl politickou a ekonomickou delegaci na velmi vysoké úrovni, která zahrnovala nového guvernéra centrální banky a ministry hospodářství, ropy, zahraničních věcí a obchodu.

Skutečnost, že Raisi a Xi společně dohlíželi na podepsání 20 dvoustranných dohod o spolupráci od zemědělství, obchodu, cestovního ruchu a ochrany životního prostředí až po zdraví, pomoc při katastrofách, kulturu a sport, není ani tím hlavním.

Slavnostní zpečetění komplexního strategického partnerství mezi Íránem a Čínou tento týden znamená klíčový vývoj ve sféře multipolarity: dva panovníci – oba rovněž spojení strategickým partnerstvím s Ruskem – vtiskli domácím publiku a také globálnímu Jihu svou vizi spravedlivějšího, spravedlivé a udržitelné 21. století, které zcela obchází západní diktát.

Peking a Teherán poprvé navázaly své komplexní strategické partnerství, když Si Ťin-pching navštívil Írán v roce 2016 – pouhý rok po podepsání Společného komplexního akčního plánu (JCPOA), neboli íránské jaderné dohody.

V roce 2021 podepsaly Peking a Teherán 25letou dohodu o spolupráci, která převedla komplexní partnerství do praktického hospodářského a kulturního rozvoje v několika oblastech, zejména v energetice, obchodu a infrastruktuře. Do té doby byl nejen Írán (po desetiletí), ale i Čína terčem jednostranných amerických sankcí.

Zde je relativně nezávislá analýza výzev a vyhlídek 25leté dohody. A zde je poučný pohled ze sousedního Pákistánu, rovněž strategického partnera Číny.

Írán: musí modernizovat všechno

Peking a Teherán již aktivně spolupracují na výstavbě vybraných linek teheránského metra, vysokorychlostní železnice Teherán-Isfahán a samozřejmě společných energetických projektů. Čínský technologický gigant Huawei je připraven pomoci Teheránu vybudovat rámec pro telekomunikační síť 5G.

Raisi a Si předvídatelně zdůraznili zvýšenou společnou koordinaci v OSN a Šanghajské organizaci pro spolupráci (SCO), jejímž nejnovějším členem je Írán, a také novou cestu podél iniciativy Belt and Road Initiative (BRI).

I když o tom nebyla žádná explicitní zmínka, základem všech těchto iniciativ je dedolarizace obchodu – v rámci SCO, ale také multipolární skupiny států BRICS. Írán se má stát jedním z nových členů BRICS+, což je obrovský krok, o kterém se má rozhodnout na nadcházejícím summitu v Jihoafrické republice v srpnu příštího roku.

V Teheránu existují odhady, že roční obchod mezi Íránem a Čínou může ve střednědobém horizontu přesáhnout 70 miliard dolarů, což bude činit trojnásobek současných čísel.

Pokud jde o budování infrastruktury, Írán je klíčovým partnerem BRI. Geostrategii je samozřejmě těžké rovnat: 2250 km pobřeží zahrnující Perský záliv, Hormuzský průliv, Ománské moře a Kaspické moře – a obrovské pozemní hranice s Irákem, Tureckem, Arménií, Ázerbájdžánem, Turkmenistánem, Afghánistánem a Pákistánem. Každý think-tank v Číně vidí, jak je Írán nenahraditelný, a to nejen z hlediska pozemních koridorů BRI, ale také námořní hedvábné stezky .

Přístav Chabahar může být hlavní íránsko-indickou záležitostí jako součást mezinárodního severojižního dopravního koridoru (INSTC) – tedy přímo spojený s indickou vizí Hedvábné stezky, která se rozšiřuje do Střední Asie.

Čínští vývojáři přístavů však mají jiné nápady, zaměřené na alternativní přístavy podél Perského zálivu a v Kaspickém moři. To posílí lodní spojení do Střední Asie (Turkmenistán a Kazachstán), Ruska a na Kavkaz (Ázerbájdžán).

A to dává dokonalý smysl, když se spojí rozvoj přístavních terminálů s modernizací íránských železnic – až po vysokorychlostní železnici. Ještě revolučnějším vývojem by byla Čína koordinující BRI spojení íránského koridoru s již probíhajícím 3200 km dlouhým čínsko-pákistánským ekonomickým koridorem (CPEC) z Kašgaru v Sin-ťiangu do přístavu Gwadar v Indickém oceánu.

To se zdálo naprosto věrohodné, když byl pákistánský premiér Imran Khan stále u moci, než byl sesazen zákonným převratem. Klíčem celého podniku je vybudování tolik potřebné infrastruktury v Balúčistánu na obou stranách hranice. Na pákistánské straně by to znamenalo dlouhou cestu k rozbití „povstalců“ typu Balúčistánské osvobozené armády živených CIA, zbavení se nezaměstnanosti a přenesení obchodu do vedení hospodářského rozvoje.

Do rovnice samozřejmě vstupuje Afghánistán – v podobě čínsko-afghánsko-iránského koridoru napojeného na CPEC. Od září 2021 Peking Talibanu podrobně vysvětloval, jak mohou profitovat z infrastrukturního koridoru – kompletního se železnicí, dálnicí a plynovodem – od Sin-ťiang, přes Wakhanský koridor ve východním Afghánistánu, přes Hindúkuš až po celou cestu. do Íránu.

Jádro multipolarity

Írán má ideální pozici pro čínský boom vysokorychlostní nákladní železnice, která spojuje Írán s většinou střední Asie (Kazachstán, Turkmenistán, Tádžikistán, Kyrgyzstán).

To v praxi znamená skvělou konektivitu s velkým logistickým klastrem: Zvláštní ekonomickou zónou (SEZ) v Khorgos, pouhých 330 km od Almaty na kazašsko-čínské hranici a pouhé čtyři hodiny od Urumči, hlavního města Sin-ťiang.

Pokud by to Čína zvládla, byl by to jakýsi Svatý grál BRI, propojující Čínu a Írán přes Kazachstán, Turkmenistán, Afghánistán a Pákistán. Nic méně než několik chodeb v jedné.

To vše se má stát, protože islámská revoluce v Íránu slaví své 44. výročí .

To, co se již nyní děje, geopoliticky a Čínou plně uznávané, by se dalo definovat jako úplné odmítnutí absurdity: kolektivní západ se chová k Íránu jako k vydědence nebo v nejlepším případě k podrobené neokolonii.

Vzhledem k tomu, že se konečně konsolidovaly rozmanité prvky odporu zakotvené v islámské revoluci, vypadá to, že historie konečně pohání Írán jako jeden z klíčových pólů nejsložitějšího procesu, který funguje ve 21. století: integrace Eurasie.

44 let po islámské revoluci se tedy Írán těší ze strategického partnerství se třemi nejvyššími BRICS: Čínou, Ruskem a Indií. Írán se pravděpodobně stane jedním z prvních nových členů BRICS+ a je prvním západoasijským státem, který se stal plnoprávným členem SCO, a uzavírá dohodu o volném obchodu (FTA) s Euroasijskou hospodářskou unií (EAEU).

Írán je vedle Ruska a Indie hlavním strategickým partnerem jak BRI v čele s Čínou, tak INSTC.

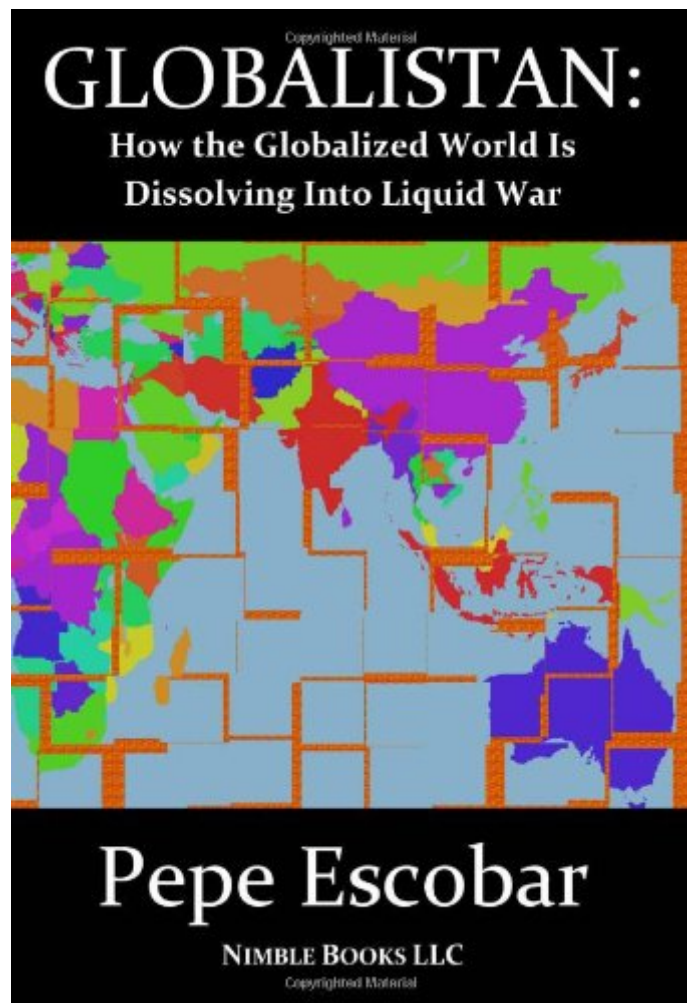
Vzhledem k tomu, že JCPOA je téměř mrtvá a všechny západní „sliby“ leží v prachu, Teherán upevňuje svůj střed zpět na východ závratnou rychlostí.

To, co Raisi a Si zpečetili v Pekingu, je předzvěstí čínského prvenství v celé západní Asii – v Pekingu to velmi vnímalo jako přirozený důsledek uznání a ctění regionální centrály Íránu.

Íránská strategie „Look East“ nemůže být více kompatibilní s BRI – řada projektů BRI totiž urychlí ekonomický rozvoj Íránu a upevní jeho nevyhnutelnou roli, pokud jde o obchodní koridory a dodavatele energie.

Během 80. let byl Teherán ovládán strategií „Ani východ ani západ“ – věrná zásadám islámské revoluce. To se nyní pragmaticky vyvinulo v „Podívejte se na východ“. Teherán se v dobré víře pokusil „podívat se na západ“, ale to, co americká vláda udělala s JCPOA – od její vraždy přes „maximální nátlak“ až po přerušenu resuscitaci – byla docela historická lekce.

To, co Raisi a Xi právě předvedli v Pekingu, je suverénní cesta vpřed. Tři vůdci integrace Eurasie – Čína, Rusko a Írán – jsou rychle na cestě ke konsolidaci jádra multipolarity.

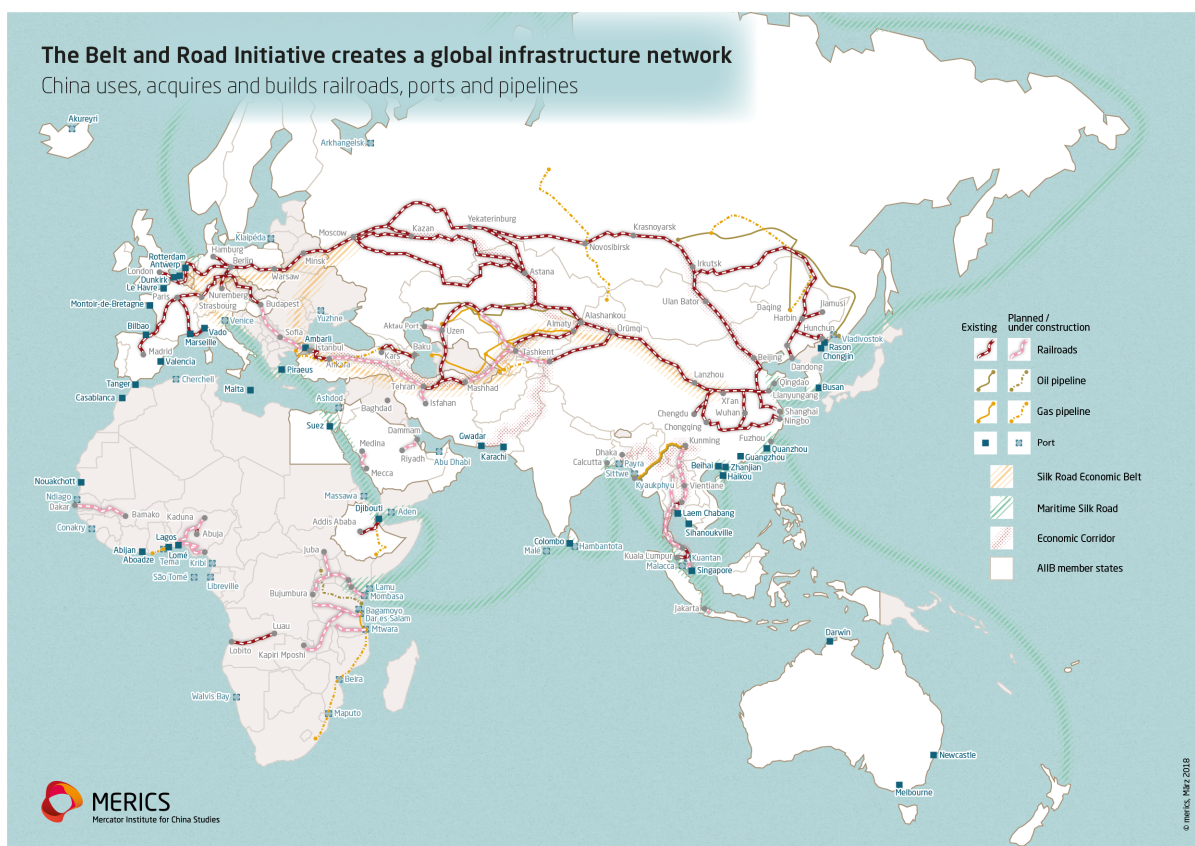

This week's ceremonial sealing of the Iran-China comprehensive strategic partnership marks a key evolution in the multipolarity sphere: two **Sovereigns** . . .

I consider the use of this term, *Sovereign*, progress. Though it should be wholly distinguished from *Sovereignty*. as this author mistakenly alludes in his last paragraph:

What Raisi and Xi have just demonstrated in Beijing is the **Sovereign way forward**. The three leaders of Eurasia integration – China, Russia and Iran – are fast on their way to consolidate the core of multipolarity.

Sovereign is a worthwhile identifier within the geopolitical context.

Westoids like to believe that China has a beef with Russia over Siberia which Japan had craved since winning the Russo-Japanese War in 1904-1905. What the Chinese has resented was the cession of its 'Outer Manchuria' territory to Russia by the Qing Dynasty in 1860, following the Second Opium War which culminated in a set of humiliating 'Unequal Treaties'. Even though Russia was not an antagonist in that war, the Russians were able to extort 'Outer Manchuria' from the Qing Manchus in exchange for political support against the British and French who were China's antagonists in the Second Opium War. The Japanese Navy would later destroy the Russian Navy in the Battle of Tsushima Strait during the Russo-Japanese War. A century later, the Soviet invasion of Manchuria, Korea as well as the Sakhalin and Kuril Islands during the last weeks of WWII would establish the current boundaries of East Asia with the U.S. military arriving to occupy Japan and South Korea after Hirohito's surrender.

The gist of my post here is point out that the geosecurity competition in East Asia is not China vs Russia but China *and* Russia vs the U.S. military in Japan. What was once a territorial loss of China ('Outer Manchuria') became its geopolitical gain as Russia has served as its buffer State against Imperial Japan in

the past and against the US military in Japan today. This geosecurity reality is what the Chinese revanchists tend to forget when they dream of recovering 'Outer Manchuria' from Russia which more than 'paid' for its acquisition of that territory by the Soviet invasion of 'Inner Manchuria' and its return to China after WWII. Here's a video on Japan's decision to continue its energy investment in the Sakhalin-1 project as part of its bid to reduce its reliance on Middle Eastern Oil:



Japan used to occupy the Southern part of Sakhalin Island which it lost to the USSR following the Soviet invasion of Manchuria. The Japanese don't even need to reclaim its lost territory there because they can just invest their capital into whatever suits their economic interests.
